

#### **Candidate Questionnaire Responses**

The West Coast Chamber serves as an advocate for business at the local, state, and federal level for our 1,200+ member organizations and nearly 80,000 member employees. Our commitment is to educate our members on important policy issues, provide access to our elected officials, and serve as an advocate for a business-friendly environment.

In an effort to educate our community and prepare residents to cast their ballot in the upcoming election, we created and shared a brief questionnaire with all candidates running for city office to better understand their stance on business related issues. All candidates were contacted and given two weeks to respond to the questionnaire. Responses from those who completed the questionnaire are reflected below.

#### Richard Van Dorp III

Regulation & Permitting -- What steps would you take to ensure city policies and processes, such as zoning and permitting, support business growth while balancing community needs?

The City of Zeeland has been viewed as a business and development friendly community not only for the policies we support, but also by making the process as smooth as possible for those looking to invest in our community.

## Housing & Affordability -- How would you address the housing challenges that impact both residents and employers' ability to attract and retain workers?

Over the past several years the city has supported several projects with Act 210 and Brownfield Redevelopment tax incentives which have added much needed housing options within our city. As Mayor I will continue to support similar projects to ensure we have additional housing options for current and future residents.

# Infrastructure -- Transportation & Growth How would you approach investments in infrastructure (roads, broadband, utilities, transportation) to meet the needs of residents and employers while ensuring fiscal responsibility?

The City of Zeeland has some of the lowest utility costs in the region and I will continue to support policies that keep those prices low for our businesses and residents.

We have always had an aggressive approach to investing in our infrastructure and I plan to see that continue as our next Mayor.

I will continue to support events which bring both residents and visitors alike to our downtown, which help support our small businesses. I will also continue to support policies which help developers and small business owners continue to invest in their properties.

# Regulation & Permitting -- What steps would you take to ensure city policies and processes, such as zoning and permitting, support business growth while balancing community needs?

I believe an important way to mutually support businesses and community members is to have a clear, future-forward and data-driven plan that informs decision making. There is only so much one can predict in a city's future— having an agreed upon, overarching vision provides the ability to navigate expected and unexpected circumstances with clarity and confidence, especially regarding situations that are more nuanced in whether or not the outcome equally benefits residents and businesses. Our city, while extremely desirable from both a residential and commercial perspective, has limited space and resources. Decisions must be carefully weighed to ensure the final decision represents the best outcome for Zeeland. Knowing that the current Masterplan needs to be updated, it's vital the future version is built upon thorough research with dedicated effort to ensure insights are collected throughout the city and include detailed feedback from both residents and businesses about their current successes, obstacles, needs and hopes for the future. A healthy city knows growth requires action, but that action must be first informed by listening and learning from others, helping keep a strong legacy centered as it moves into the future.

# Housing & Affordability -- How would you address the housing challenges that impact both residents and employers' ability to attract and retain workers?

A recent presentation given at a council meeting highlighted that a key frustration employees in our area experience is the lack of housing options and affordability. With so many wonderful businesses in Zeeland offering strong career opportunities, our council certainly wants to do our part to help attract and retain talent! One exciting area I'd love to see continue to grow is a commitment to thoughtful, effective housing solutions that creatively make use of Zeeland's available resources, such as the new Sligh apartments or the Brownfield project at State and Main. I believe we should protect current housing, carefully weighing the costs of expansion projects that remove housing opportunities, seeking solutions that benefit both initiatives whenever possible. Additionally, I know housing is an issue throughout Ottawa County, so I think it's important we stay informed of broader discussions, resources or projects that would benefit our city. Finally, while being able to offer housing to anyone interested in living in Zeeland is the goal, I also think ensuring infrastructure decisions consider commuters' experiences with parking, traffic flow, bike paths, amenities and bus routes is another important way council can support our local businesses and their workforces.

Infrastructure -- Transportation & Growth How would you approach investments in infrastructure (roads, broadband, utilities, transportation) to meet the needs of residents and employers while ensuring fiscal responsibility?

As a communications and marketing specialist, my career is rooted in data, research and informed decision-making. Just because something initially sounds like a good idea or worked for someone else doesn't mean, after considering our specific circumstances, it's therefore the right choice for us. I know our council upholds this perspective, as demonstrated through recent discussions about whether to pursue broadband or parking ramps. I would strive to continue this track record, pushing us to be forward-thinking where it makes the best sense for Zeeland, supporting decisions that enable our community to face future growth and opportunities. Many infrastructure projects take years to plan and execute. Doing them responsibly requires a dedication to evaluating if projects consider the connections between current issues and possible future needs. For example, if the city is going to tear up the road to repair sewer lines, they discuss the repairs but also evaluate if this is an opportunity to institute upgrades that could handle future changes in utility needs due to commercial or residential growth. I believe this is exactly the mindset a city needs to make effective, responsible decisions that prepare for the future while stewarding well what we already have.

### Downtown & Commercial Districts -- What is your vision for supporting vibrant downtowns and commercial corridors that attract businesses, talent, and visitors?

Having had a Zeeland address nearly my whole life, it's been amazing watching the incredible change that has happened over the last several decades. From beautification efforts, family-friendly amenities and events, ordinance changes, parking initiatives—there are countless examples of work that has been done to turn Zeeland into a destination, something I am very passionate about continuing. I would be a strong advocate for prioritizing initiatives that encourage reasons for visitors to linger, retain residents by continuing to grow available amenities, and equip businesses with what they need to thrive. I am excited by the potential of creating a recreational center that would significantly increase our ability to include more residents of all ages in programming, and I have appreciated the city's efforts to try to solve the parking problems downtown. I would love to see continued focus on updating public spaces and making downtown accessible, safe and welcoming. I would also support beautification and walkability efforts in our commercial corridors and seeking to understand any specific needs of the businesses there.

## Future Vision & Leadership -- Looking ahead 5–10 years, what is your vision for the city's economic future, and what specific actions would you champion as a councilmember to make it a reality?

I believe Zeeland is currently in an extremely strong position—a strong tax base, robust employment and abundance of job opportunities, thriving community culture, noticeable beautification, and many important improvements. But just because things are going well doesn't mean we aren't at a critical juncture. Our current position is because of decisions made five, ten, twenty years ago. When I envision a healthy, thriving Zeeland in 5-10 years, I first focus on the responsibility and meaningful forethought that vision will require of its leaders today. There are many ways a city can choose to invest time, money and resources—but distributing those wisely is key. Despite our positive momentum, we must avoid flippant decision making, continuing to hold ourselves accountable to ensuring all strategic planning stays focused on prioritizing the most beneficial ways to attract and come alongside residents, businesses and visitors in our area for continued future success. I believe through tactful questioning, intentional

research, a commitment to our values and a desire to listen to the needs from all corners of our community will ensure the decisions we make today also will hold true in the future.

### Regulation & Permitting -- What steps would you take to ensure city policies and processes, such as zoning and permitting, support business growth while balancing community needs?

The city is, in essence, built out. However, there are things we can do. We can shrink minimum lot size requirements....shrink the minimum setback requirements also. Small steps for sure but every little piece helps. The townships really need to take the lead because as I said the City of Zeeland is essentially built out.

# Infrastructure -- Transportation & Growth How would you approach investments in infrastructure (roads, broadband, utilities, transportation) to meet the needs of residents and employers while ensuring fiscal responsibility?

We reinvest approximately \$3 million per year on our road water sewer infrastructure currently. Max bus runs through Zeeland. The business community needs the infrastructure we provide to be successful and we need the businesses to provide the jobs. We are all in this together. JR Automation is relocating its headquarters to Zeeland partly because we are committed to improving the infrastructure around their site on Riley. I'm proud to partner with the business community!

### Downtown & Commercial Districts -- What is your vision for supporting vibrant downtowns and commercial corridors that attract businesses, talent, and visitors?

My vision includes the continued use of Act 210 commercial rehab tax incentives. Numerous businesses have taken advantage of this incentive over the last few years and the benefits are obvious. Also, the snowmelt that has been installed the last 2 years will be a huge benefit in the coming years and expansion of the snowmelt system is on the horizon. I am proud to have been a part of these decisions and pledge to continue doing more for our downtown businesses and customers.

# Future Vision & Leadership -- Looking ahead 5–10 years, what is your vision for the city's economic future, and what specific actions would you champion as a councilmember to make it a reality?

I serve on the Act 198 Exemption Committee currently. I will continue to be receptive to projects big and small in that role. The amount of money invested and the number of jobs that are created is quite amazing to be honest. I would love to see a bit of diversification of our tax base. However, overall I am very satisfied with how the city and the business community have a great relationship. I strive to maintain and improve our commitment to the community
